New China Calendar



Woodblock printing has had a long history in China. The earliest examples are Buddhist images printed in the Tang Dynasty – ninth century. For a thousand years woodcuts made by the common people have been used for popular book illustrations, playing cards, and New Year's pictures. But by the nineteenth century this ancient art was stagnant, part of a dying feudal culture.

In the late 1920s the prominent writer and cultural leader Lu Hsun looked for a new art style to use in the rising struggle against feudalism and the reactionary forces of old China. He especially admired the bold, simple woodcuts created by Kathe Köllwitz, the German Socialist artist, in the print series "Der Krieg" (War). Lu Hsun brought albums of these prints to China, and taught young artists the new techniques. "In a revolutionary age, woodcuts have the widest use," he wrote, "they can be quickly produced by busy people." Using only the simplest tools – a block of wood, a sharp knife, paper, and ink – and the new simplified method, many prints of each design could be made.

The woodcuts reproduced in this calendar are examples of this flourishing medium in China today. Woodblock printing is widely used by both professional artists and workers who are artists in their spare time, and reflect the spirit and accomplishments of the people in their struggle to develop a modern, industrial, socialist state. The urban environment, with men and women building the future, is sharply in focus. Now, as earlier, woodcuts have an important place in China's revolutionary culture.

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
